Dear Partners,

When measuring the effectiveness of fundraising we often think of buildings we have constructed or the sophisticated technology we have been able to purchase. But that is only part of the equation; the true measure of philanthropy is the difference our gifts make in the lives of the people we touch.

We all know that diabetes is a significant area of focus for White Memorial Medical Center because it is rampant in our community—approximately 20 percent of our population is afflicted with this disease. UniHealth Foundation has made a grant of \$750,000 to help WMMC design and develop a system for ensuring comprehensive care for those with chronic diseases such as diabetes. When implemented, this program will educate patients with chronic diseases on how to take better care of themselves to avoid repeated emergency room visits and enjoy a much improved quality of life. We are extremely grateful for this generous gift and for the past years of support from UniHealth Foundation, which also provided initial grant funding for our TELACU/White Memorial Medical Center Nursing Scholarship Program 10 years ago.

Recently, after completing her rounds of distributing books and puzzles, Bank of America Intern Myra Hernandez realized that patients with vision problems could not enjoy these materials. To better serve them, she and a group of volunteers are now hand-making and distributing paper flowers, which can be appreciated by all. She also initiated a project to make pinwheels so patients can practice their breathing by blowing on the pinwheels and seeing them turn. Myra is just one example of the many volunteers/interns who give their time and energy to improve patients' lives. Bank of America Foundation made this possible when it created the Career Pathway Intern Program through grants of \$1.5 million in total support to date. Staff report that patient satisfaction scores are higher in the units where the interns are

working. Many of the participants have been offered full-time employment at WMMC or other local businesses.

WMMC operates one of the few Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Units (NICUs) in Los Angeles. Since December our at-risk newborns have been protected by state-of-the-art technology—NeoBlue lights—purchased with some of the proceeds from our annual Gala. Babies are safer and have a better chance of flourishing because friends of WMMC contributed to the success of this fundraising event.

Sometime in the future, White Memorial will receive special gifts to expand and enhance patient care priorities from a group of individuals participating in WMMC's new Estate Planning Program. Introduced last spring through WMMC Board members and staff leadership, the program offers free consultations with an estate planning expert. Thus far, three participants have completed new plans or revised existing ones, saving their families 80 percent in taxes and providing WMMC with important future funding.

As Chair of the Foundation Board of Directors, I take great pride in our hospital, and I want to thank each and every one of our donors. As a lifelong member of this community, I am proud to see the significant difference our gifts are making.

Thanks to our planned giving efforts, our 2011 total production was \$7,286,706. (Production is calculated according to benchmark standards from the Association for Hospital Philanthropy, and reflects cash gifts and pledges from all sources, government grants, proceeds from events and planned gift expectancies.)

We also track the time spent by our staff on multiple important priorities: fundraising; donor-funded program management; volunteers and workforce development; external relations; government relations; and other projects for the hospital.

Full-time equivalent (FTE) Foundation employees devoted solely to fundraising in 2011: 3.72.

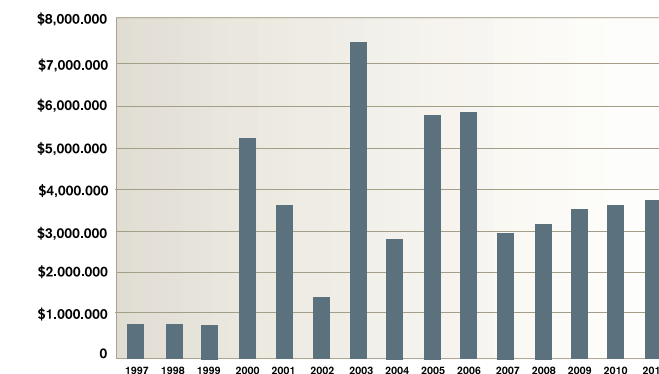
The cost to raise one dollar in 2011 was 18 cents, below the 2010 national benchmark for hospitals of 33 cents.

Generous Grant Will Help with Chronic Care Patients

White Memorial has received a \$750,000 grant from the UniHealth Foundation to redesign delivery of care for chronic care patients under the provisions of health care reform, using diabetes as the pilot.

The 18-month pilot project is being spearheaded by Charitable Foundation Board member Hector Flores, MD, chairman of the hospital’s Department of Family Medicine and co-director of the Family Medicine Residency Program.

In announcing the award, Dr. Flores said “This grant will enable WMMC to design a system to keep victims of chronic disease from ‘falling through the cracks.’ Too often, patients will be admitted through the Emergency Department with life-threatening symptoms. We treat and stabilize their condition, prescribe a course of ongoing medication, diet, exercise and discharge them. The breakdown occurs at some point thereafter. The patient forgets instructions, stops taking medications or otherwise fails to ‘self-manage’ their condition, with the result that their situation worsens and the cycle begins again.

“The goals,” Dr. Flores continued, “are to develop the organizational, technical and clinical components needed to improve patient outcomes; ensure coordination of care

between hospital and outpatient settings; increase physician engagement; establish data collection, tracking and reporting mechanisms; and ensure the hospital’s residency programs meet educational needs that support diabetes research.”

Some of the specifics include:

- Implementing clinical protocols and monitoring mechanisms for glycemic control
- Strengthening the role of WMMC’s outpatient diabetes program
- Developing post-hospitalization clinics within the internal medicine and family medicine residency programs
- Providing continuing medical education training for physicians on clinical outcomes and performance metrics
- Establishing a diabetes research and evaluation team
- Engaging residents in the research to measure and compare glucose management outcomes.

The Family Medicine Residency Program: Unparalleled Success and a Model for the Nation

Gilbert Medina, MD grew up living five minutes from White Memorial but it wasn’t until college that he knew he wanted to be a doctor. While pursuing his undergraduate degree he connected with several Latino medical school students who became his role models.

After medical school he trained with the White Memorial Family Medicine Residency Program and then joined Family Care Specialists Medical Group.

Today he is as passionate about helping teach the next generation of Latino doctors as he is about providing culturally sensitive care to his patients.

Dr. Medina is not alone. Since its inauguration in July 1988, when the Family Medicine Residency joined the other four residency programs at WMMC, it has become the centerpiece of minority family medicine medical education in Southern California. This model program trains young physicians to become competent, concerned and compassionate family physicians who are comfortable practicing in urban and rural settings, principally in underserved areas and with a particular focus on the health needs of the Latino community. Its success in meeting societal needs is unparalleled among the more than 450 family medicine residency programs in the United States.

Each of the five medical residency programs at WMMC has been successful in attracting residents who bring a strong commitment to medically underserved communities by virtue of personal experience, cultural and linguistic ties and sensitivity to populations in need. Nearly 70 percent of Family Medicine Residency participants have come from under-represented ethnic minorities and disadvantaged backgrounds, and the program has successfully placed more than 70 percent of its graduates in underserved areas.

“This program truly makes a positive impact on the community of East Los Angeles and similar communities of unmet health care need,” said Charitable Foundation Board member Hector Flores, MD, chairman of the hospital’s Department of Family Medicine and co-director of the residency program. “We understand overall community health problems and apply community-wide approaches to prevention and treatment.”

Investing in Tomorrow's Leaders

Last year White Memorial received a \$500,000 grant from the Bank of America Foundation to enhance the hospital's Workforce Development and Volunteer Program. Through the program local youths and young adults volunteer at the hospital, learning vital job skills while helping provide non-clinical assistance to patients. The first two cohorts, totaling 39 paid interns aged 16-24, have now completed the 12-week Career Pathway Internship Program and received stipend checks from Bank of America for their work. The third group will “graduate” in mid-summer.

A key component of the program has interns rounding throughout the hospital, working in different areas ranging from the cafeteria to the surgery waiting room. They consult with nursing supervisors, visit patients, offer patients and families health education materials and information about community resources, and conduct patient satisfaction

surveys. Students must complete a three-month internship, working 10-12 hours each week.

“This program has been a great success so far. We have interns who are learning real-world skills that can lead to a healthcare career,” says Alicia Anaya, WMMC's Workforce Development Manager. “These paid internships allow them to interact with staff and patients to learn new skills, hone their interpersonal and social communication abilities and gain self-confidence. Some participants have already been hired by the hospital and others are continuing their education in the medical field.”

“I'm really glad that I became a volunteer for WMMC,” says Bagner Gonzalez, who completed the program and is now employed by WMMC. “Being part of this program has shown me many great things about life and about giving a helping hand to others.” Gonzalez joined WMMC's staff on September 12, 2011 and received his stipend at the celebration ceremony. “My experience has been great from the start. It has helped me gain insight on how the hospital operates. The opportunity to explore the different departments allowed me to expand my interest in the health care profession.”

Patients are grateful to have the young people assisting in their care, whether for translation assistance or simply to bring a cold drink. “They didn't want to stop saying thank you,” says Ana Perez, 21, a student at East Los Angeles College, whose goal is to become a physician. For 26-year-old Mayra Hernandez, who has volunteered at WMMC for 10 years and is now part of the internship program, “this is an emotional experience for me. I cried with a man who has no family and had not had a visitor in a long time. He was happy just to have someone from the neighborhood to come speak with him.”

The young interns feel especially satisfied that “we grew up here” in the Boyle Heights and East Los Angeles areas and are able to help their own neighbors. They are eager to work in their neighborhood after completing their studies. The interaction with patients has made the experience “one that I will not forget,” says Edson Rodriguez, who wants to study to become a neurosurgeon.

“These youngsters are nothing short of amazing,” says Garret Ginn, Senior Vice President of Global Marketing & Corporate Affairs at Bank of America, who recently visited with internship program members. “Bank of America is proud to be part of a program that is helping set more and more opportunities into motion for these young leaders and for the communities White Memorial serves. We are delighted to partner with the hospital to provide an innovative bridge between education, community service and workforce development. Whether the training enables them to find meaningful employment now or pursue a college degree and become a leader of tomorrow, the investment we have made is making a real difference now and will continue to pay dividends far into the future.”

Since its inception four years ago, the Workforce Development and Volunteer Program



has benefited more than 500 young adults. It has also created opportunities for the residents of East Los Angeles to learn more about jobs in the healthcare field and provided training for them to pursue health careers. WMMC actively recruits people from the surrounding areas. Available positions are posted on the hospital website at whitememorial.com.

From Volunteer to Future Physician

Cynthia Marquez has known since she was 4 years old that she wanted to be a doctor. She'd help patch up her little sister's bumps and scratches with bits of gauze and bandages her father, Cesar Marquez, who works in the Purchasing Department of White Memorial, would bring home to Highland Park. When she turned 14, Cynthia leapt at the chance to join White Memorial's volunteer program, where during the past six years she has learned compassion, professionalism and how to work well with others. Now 20, Cynthia is still a volunteer as well as a biology major at Cal State Los Angeles, with plans to transfer to UCLA or USC and ultimately give back to the community as a pediatrician or family medicine doctor.

“I love volunteering at White Memorial,” she said, “and talking to the patients, helping them with whatever they need and trying to make their stay better. I've learned different skills and am able to see a different side of myself.”

The partnership between Bank of America and WMMC has proven to be an effective model for building tomorrow's

community leaders. Many of these young people have overcome challenges and the volunteer program gives them an incentive to stay in school, help their families and care for people in the community. Ultimately, they gain career skills and become valuable members of the local workforce. Most want to pursue a career in the healthcare field.

In 2011 volunteers devoted 17,274 hours in 38 different departments of the hospital. The California Hospital Association values this as a \$404,557 benefit to the hospital.

“Volunteer work has made me a better person,” Cynthia said. “Being able to communicate with people and help them—it's a really good experience.”

SIMULATION LAB

Education That Saves Lives



You've heard of flight simulation,

in which pilots practice before going up in an actual airplane. Now meet SimMom, a life-size mannequin who breathes, talks, cries — and gives birth.

SimMom – together with SimMan and SimBaby – brings an unprecedented degree of realism to healthcare education. She has human-like skin, a pulse and true-to-life weight. Give her the wrong medication and she can go into cardiac arrest. Caregivers practice on her in a highly realistic but safe learning environment, following computer-based videotaped scenarios run by instructors. The Charitable Foundation is actively seeking funds to establish a fully-equipped simulation laboratory at White Memorial.

"Simulation training has become the standard for continuing medical education," said Cinna Wohlmut, MD, program director of White Memorial's OB/GYN Residency Program. "It's a powerful tool for acquiring and practicing clinical skills."

One of its mightiest uses is coordinating team responses, said Byron Williams, MD, president of the hospital's medical staff. Team members can see both the details and a procedure in its entirety, he said.

Additionally, patients with chronic conditions like diabetes and heart disease will learn how to better manage their care in the lab. Pregnant moms will see what to expect before, during and after their babies' arrival. Local young people will get a hands-on, practical glimpse into healthcare as a potential career.

"This lab will help save lives," said Lynne Whaley, RN, White Memorial's senior vice president of clinical operations and Chief Nurse Executive. "It lets caregivers hone their critical thinking and clinical skills with zero chance of patient injury."

The 900-square-foot lab can be up and running in the Specialty Care Tower within 10 months of securing funding. The need must be met entirely through charitable fundraising, and the Foundation Board of Directors has designated this a priority project. A total of \$1 million is needed.

The simulation laboratory project received a generous "seed grant" of \$270,000 from the Lyman Brewer Fund to initiate the fundraising effort. The Lyman Brewer family and the fund have been constant supporters of White Memorial's commitment to the training of young physicians and nurses over the years. In a very real way, the Brewer family will continue to partner with WMMC far into the future. Gifts are being sought from individuals, corporations and foundations.

He has also served as a gubernatorial appointee to numerous California state commissions. He recently completed a five-year term as Chairman of the United States Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, where he continues to serve as an active member of the Board of Directors, representing the interests of the nation's three million Hispanic-owned businesses.

Zuzka Polishook: Providing a Gateway to Health

Born and raised in Slovakia, successful businesswoman and philanthropist Zuzka Polishook has always been passionate about fitness, food and nutrition. So it was only natural that when she was introduced to White Memorial last year she immediately connected with the hospital's Healthy Eating Lifestyle Program (HELP), which teaches healthy eating and activity habits for children with or at risk for diabetes.

Zuzka's generous donation made possible the new White Memorial Fitness Path, a half-mile walking path that was dedicated in January. The path is open to the entire community.

Zuzka got started in her career in Prague, the Czech Republic. She moved to New York in 1993 and then to Los Angeles three years later.

Zuzka provided marketing for Fortune 500 companies, including Unilever, Disney and Avery Dennison. In 1999 she began consulting for a variety of internet and e-commerce clients.

She and her husband Phil have also been involved in numerous non-profit organizations, including the St. Joseph Center, a homeless

and family center in Venice, CA; Community Services Unlimited in Los Angeles, which teaches urban farming and promotes the local sale of fresh produce; and the SCORE fund in Los Angeles, which helps youths who have sustained spinal cord injuries while participating in sports or athletics.

“I'm a huge believer in making opportunities available to people,” Zuzka said.

Zuzka and Phil live in Pacific Palisades and are dedicated to their two daughters, Mira, 11 and Nina, 8.

Down the Path To Fitness

Crystal Rengifo, a treatment authorization request coordinator at White Memorial, is terrified of diabetes, which runs in her family. So when she was diagnosed with pre-diabetes a year ago she knew she had to take action.

“The day I had dreaded so much had come,” Crystal said. “I've seen what diabetes does. My mother, my two sisters and my brother all had strokes because of this disease. I felt I owed it to my husband and my daughter to make changes.”

Crystal lost 20 pounds by improving her eating habits, but she didn't exercise regularly even though she belonged to a gym. That all changed with the opening of the White Memorial Fitness Path in January. Crystal walks the path after work four days a week, for three miles each day. She's stronger, sleeps better and her doctor is thrilled with her progress.

The half-mile path, which winds around and through the hospital campus, was made possible by a generous gift from Zuzka Polishook, a local businesswoman and philanthropist who wanted to make a difference. Her vision to provide a safe and accessible way for the children in the hospital's Healthy Eating Lifestyle Program (HELP) to exercise was broadened to include patients, family members, employees and the entire local community.

“The fitness path is there and available to everyone,” Zuzka said. “People who come to White Memorial don't always have a place to exercise outdoors in their immediate neighborhood. Many of them are already coming to the hospital so now we've given them a way to exercise. And they can do it without being an athlete or needing a gym membership.”

Zuzka spoke passionately at the path's dedication and became Crystal's inspiration. “She motivated me!” Crystal said. “I thought her gift to the hospital and the community was such a wonderful thing.”

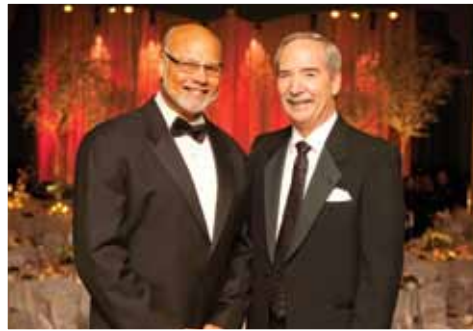

Makes a Difference in Patient Lives

The Giraffe bed is just one example of how the generosity of White Memorial employees makes a difference.



Isabel Ortega* gazed petrified at her tiny premature son lying in the special bed in White Memorial's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Only 26 weeks old and swathed in a web of tubes and wires he looked so incredibly fragile she was afraid to touch him.

Indeed, every time extremely premature babies are moved they're at risk for bleeding in the brain. But Isabel's touch was critical. Skin-to-skin contact would not only facilitate bonding but actually stabilize the baby's vital signs and help him grow and develop at a better rate. It could mean the difference to her baby's survival.

Encouraged by the nurses, Isabel donned a gown and a nurse lifted the baby, wires and all, and placed him on Isabel's bare chest. Thankfully, the special "Giraffe bed" used for her son enabled the nurses to move him easily, with a minimum of jostling. A regular isolette opens on the side and requires disconnecting and reconnecting the breathing ventilator and other life-giving tubes each time the baby is moved. But the Giraffe bed opens on the top so the baby can simply be lifted out. The bed reduces stress to the baby, helps decrease infections, shields the baby from noise and, because it provides better access, enables all procedures to be done without moving the newborn.

Isabel held her son every day after that, until he was healthy enough to go home.

The Giraffe bed is just one example of how the generosity of White Memorial employees makes a difference.

The bed was purchased with funds donated by White Memorial employees during the 2011 annual Employee Giving Campaign.

Therapy Dogs Light Up Patient's Lives

Anyone who's ever owned a pet knows they make us happier. Numerous studies have also shown that their acceptance and unconditional love can help make us healthier.

Thanks to a generous donation from Dr. R. Philip Doss, an ophthalmologist with Alliance Eye Medical Group, Inc., White Memorial has begun a new pet therapy program for patients. The program is provided in conjunction with LoveOn4Paws, a nonprofit organization that helps ill and disabled patients cope with their hospitalization and aids in their rehabilitation through animal assisted therapy.

Launched in May, the program provides weekly visits to hospital patients, with two dogs and handlers making rounds. All dogs meet performance and behavior criteria and the American Kennel Club's "canine good citizenship" test, and all handler/pet teams are experienced in interacting with



people who are ill, physically handicapped, developmentally delayed, or multi-handicapped.

“Animal assisted therapy visits reduce feelings of isolation, sadness, pain and vulnerability,” said Dr. Doss, who has served on the medical staff at White Memorial for 28 years. “I'm proud and pleased to have been able to help bring this program to the hospital and the community.”
